Oral Presentation: Sustainable Tourism in Ecuador

Introduction:

Presentation Plan for 16 Students:

Students 1 and 2:

Definition and Principles of Sustainable Tourism

- Define sustainable tourism.
- Mention its key principles:
 - 1. Environmental Responsibility: Reduce waste and protect biodiversity.
 - 2. **Socio-Cultural Integrity:** Respect local culture and traditions.
 - 3. Economic Equity: Ensure benefits for local economies.

Example: Mashpi Lodge in Pichincha – eco-friendly lodge preserving the Chocó rainforest, blending luxury with conservation efforts.

Students 3 and 4:

Sustainable Tourism in Ecuador

- Discuss Ecuador's commitment to sustainable tourism.
- Highlight how Ecuador's biodiversity is a crucial element for sustainable practices.

Example: Zuleta Hacienda in Pichincha – a historic hacienda promoting cultural tourism and agroecology, famous for its condor rehabilitation project.

Students 5 and 6:

Examples in Pichincha Province

- 1. **Pululahua Geobotanical Reserve** eco-tourism within a dormant volcanic crater, offering hiking and nature observation.
- 2. **Yanacocha Reserve** birdwatching paradise focusing on the conservation of endangered species like the Black-breasted Puffleg hummingbird.

Students 7 and 8:

Examples in Cotopaxi Province

- 1. **Chugchilán and the Quilotoa Loop** sustainable hiking routes that provide eco-tourism opportunities through rural indigenous communities.
- 2. Cotopaxi National Park protected area that balances tourism with conservation, home to the active Cotopaxi volcano.

Students 9 and 10:

Certifications and Levels of Sustainable Tourism

- Explain global certifications like **Global Sustainable Tourism Council (GSTC)**, focusing on environmental, socio-cultural, and economic sustainability.
- Levels of Certification:
 - 1. Basic: Fulfills minimum criteria.
 - 2. **Intermediate:** Achieves standards in specific areas.
 - 3. Advanced: Recognized globally for sustainable leadership.

Examples: GSTC certification for high-standard practices.

Students 11 and 12:

Certifications in Latin America

- Discuss leading certifications in Latin America like Rainforest Alliance Certified and Biosphere Responsible Tourism.
- Mention the rising demand for sustainable tourism certifications across the region.

Example: Huasquila Amazon Lodge in Ecuador's Napo region – an eco-friendly lodge with Rainforest Alliance certification.

Students 13 and 14:

Certifications in Ecuador

- Highlight Ecuador's national sustainable tourism initiatives.
- Discuss local certification bodies such as **Smart Voyager** and the **Programa de Certificación de Turismo Sostenible** (Sustainable Tourism Certification Program)

 which recognizes eco-friendly practices.

Example: Bellavista Cloud Forest Reserve in Pichincha – certified by Smart Voyager for its low-impact eco-lodging practices.

Students 15 and 16:

The Role of Stakeholders in Sustainable Tourism

- **Tourists:** Choose eco-friendly options and respect local culture.
- **Tour Operators:** Prioritize sustainable practices and certified suppliers.
- Local Communities: Benefit from tourism while preserving traditions and natural resources.
- Governments and NGOs: Regulate, promote, and provide resources for sustainability.

Example: Secret Garden Hostel in Cotopaxi – a mountain hostel that employs local people and operates using sustainable energy sources.
