<p>Do up (UK) To fasten something</p>  <p>You don't need to do up the top button.</p>	<p>Stand out To be very noticeable</p>  <p>Your red dress really stands out against all those dull brown ones.</p>	<p>Pay for Give money in order to buy something</p>  <p>I paid good money for that sofa, so it should last.</p>	<p>Put on Wear something briefly to decide whether to buy it</p>  <p>Anna put on the coat.</p>
<p>Wear in (UK) To loosen or soften some new clothing by wearing it</p>  <p>That sweater will feel better after you wear it in.</p>	<p>Set (someone) back To cost someone a particular amount of money, especially a large amount</p>  <p>Anna's new laptop must have set her back \$2000.</p>	<p>Try out Test something to see if you like it</p>  <p>John hopes to try out his new running shoes this weekend.</p>	<p>Sell out Sell the whole supply/ capacity</p>  <p>I'm sorry, we've sold out of shoes.</p>

Phrasal Verbs for SHOPPING



Sell out

Sell all of the supply that you have of something
Basketball games often **sell out** well in advance.

Put on

To see if something is worth trying
Alex **put on** his jacket.

Pay for

Act of paying money
She might **pay for** dinner.

Take off

Remove a piece of clothing
Remember to **take** your shoes **off** before entering the house.

Help out

To assist someone
If you've got the time **help out** with our relative's work.

Queue up

Wait in a line behind people
I hate having to **queue up** so early just to get football match tickets.

Pop into

To visit briefly
I'm going to **pop into** the supermarket for a moment.

Splash out

Spend money freely
He **splashed out** on a iPhone.

Phrasal Verbs: Clothes



Do up

Fasten an item of clothing
E.g. You don't need to do up the top button

Dress up

Dress (oneself or another) in your best clothes
E.g. You don't need to dress up. It's just a family get-together

Zip up

To be closed by means of a zip
E.g. He zipped up his leather jacket

Dress up

Put on fancy dress in children's games
E.g. For her birthday party, they had dressed her up as a fairy

Hang out

Dry clothes outside after washing
E.g. Have you hung the washing out?

Hang up

Put something on a hook or a hanger
E.g. The women hung up their coats and sat down

Have on

Wear an item of clothing on one's person
E.g. Melissa had her new dress on

Kick off

Make your shoes come off by shaking your feet
E.g. He kicked his shoes off as soon as he got home

Slip on

Put on an item of clothing easily
E.g. She slipped her sandals on before she went into the sea

Take off

Remove any item of clothing
E.g. Anna took off her sandals

Take in

Make clothing narrower
E.g. I'll have to take this dress in at the waist - it's too big

Take up

Reduce the length of a piece of clothing
E.g. I want to take this pair of pants up. It's too long

Let out

Make clothing wider
E.g. I'm going to have this skirt let out

Wrap up

Put warm clothes on
E.g. I could hear my mother telling me to wrap up warm

Turn up

Shorten trousers, a dress or a skirt so that they fit better
E.g. Her jeans were too long, so she turned them up
