## PHRASAL VERBS (SHOPPING FOR CLOTHES)

<p><b>Do up (UK)</b> To fasten something</p>  <p>You don't need to <b>do up</b> the top button.</p>	<p><b>Stand out</b> To be very noticeable</p>  <p>Your red dress really <b>stands out</b> against all those dull brown ones.</p>	<p><b>Pay for</b> Give money in order to buy something</p>  <p>I <b>paid</b> good money <b>for</b> that sofa, so it should last.</p>	<p><b>Put on</b> Wear something briefly to decide whether to buy it</p>  <p>Anna <b>put on</b> the coat.</p>
<p><b>Wear in (UK)</b> To loosen or soften some new clothing by wearing it</p>  <p>That sweater will feel better after you <b>wear it in</b>.</p>	<p><b>Set (someone) back</b> To cost someone a particular amount of money, especially a large amount</p>  <p>Anna's new laptop must have <b>set her back</b> \$2000.</p>	<p><b>Try out</b> Test something to see if you like it</p>  <p>John hopes to <b>try out</b> his new running shoes this weekend.</p>	<p><b>Sell out</b> Sell the whole supply/ capacity</p>  <p>I'm sorry, we've <b>sold out</b> of shoes.</p>
<p><b>Go with (something)</b> To seem good, natural, or attractive in combination with something</p>  <p>Which shoes <b>go best with</b> this dress?</p>	<p><b>Splash out (UK)</b> Spend money freely</p>  <p>She <b>splashed out</b> on a Lexus.</p>	<p><b>Take off</b> Remove a piece of clothing</p>  <p>He <b>took off</b> my wet boots and made me sit by the fire.</p>	<p><b>Try on</b> Put on a piece of clothing to see if it fits</p>  <p>You should <b>try on</b> the shoes <b>on</b> before you buy them.</p>



# Phrasal Verbs for SHOPPING



## Sell out

*Sell all of the supply that you have of something*  
Basketball games often **sell out** well in advance.

## Put on

*To see if something is worth trying*  
Alex **put on** his jacket.

## Pay for

*Act of paying money*  
She might **pay for** dinner.

## Take off

*Remove a piece of clothing*  
Remember to **take** your shoes **off** before entering the house.

## Help out

*To assist someone*  
If you've got the time **help out** with our relative's work.

## Queue up

*Wait in a line behind people*  
I hate having to **queue up** so early just to get football match tickets.

## Pop into

*To visit briefly*  
I'm going to **pop into** the supermarket for a moment.

## Splash out

*Spend money freely*  
He **splashed out** on a iPhone.



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## Shopping Vocabulary

<b>Try something on</b>	Try clothes in shop before buying them		<b>Window shopping</b>	Looking at items on sale, not buying
<b>A wallet</b>	A Money/card holder		<b>What a bargain?</b>	Buy something for much less than normal
<b>On sale</b>	For sale at a reduced price		<b>A good deal</b>	if something is a good deal, paid a low price
<b>A receipt</b>	Paper proof of a purchase		<b>Take something back</b>	Return an unwanted item to a shop
<b>A fitting room</b>	A place in a shop where people try on clothes		<b>Spend money on something</b>	Use money to buy something or pay something
<b>In cash / by card</b>	Use cash or credit card to purchase something		<b>Outlet mall</b>	Both have many stores in one location.
<b>A bargain</b>	Excellent value for an item or purchase		<b>For sale</b>	Available to buy

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# Phrasal Verbs: Clothes



## Do up

*Fasten an item of clothing*

*E.g. You don't need to do up the top button*

## Dress up

*Dress (oneself or another) in your best clothes*

*E.g. You don't need to dress up. It's just a family get-together*

## Zip up

*To be closed by means of a zip*

*E.g. He zipped up his leather jacket*

## Dress up

*Put on fancy dress in children's games*

*E.g. For her birthday party, they had dressed her up as a fairy*

## Hang out

*Dry clothes outside after washing*

*E.g. Have you hung the washing out?*

## Hang up

*Put something on a hook or a hanger*

*E.g. The women hung up their coats and sat down*

## Have on

*Wear an item of clothing on one's person*

*E.g. Melissa had her new dress on*

## Kick off

*Make your shoes come off by shaking your feet*

*E.g. He kicked his shoes off as soon as he got home*

## Slip on

*Put on an item of clothing easily*

*E.g. She slipped her sandals on before she went into the sea*

## Take off

*Remove any item of clothing*

*E.g. Anna took off her sandals*

## Take in

*Make clothing narrower*

*E.g. I'll have to take this dress in at the waist - it's too big*

## Take up

*Reduce the length of a piece of clothing*

*E.g. I want to take this pair of pants up. It's too long*

## Let out

*Make clothing wider*

*E.g. I'm going to have this skirt let out*

## Wrap up

*Put warm clothes on*

*E.g. I could hear my mother telling me to wrap up warm*

## Turn up

*Shorten trousers, a dress or a skirt so that they fit better*

*E.g. Her jeans were too long, so she turned them up*
